OUTSTANDING STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS

- Andrew Aleman has been accepted into the Master's program in Criminal Justice at SHU.
- Paul Breslawski was the recipient of the Gold Medal of Excellence in Political Science. His research paper on the legacy of Chief Justice Harlan Fiske Stone was awarded the third place prize in this year's Writing Across the Curriculum contest.

Department News

New Political Science Club

A new student club housed within the Department of Government and Politics was formed during the 2010-11 academic year. The Club's official title is the "Politics and International Studies Club." Dr. Jauhari serves as the club's advisor. The club hosts forums, speakers and field trips.

Field Trips

Dr. Jauhari coordinated and chaperoned two student field trips during the Spring 2011 semester. Students visited the United Nations in New York City, and the International Institute of Connecticut in Bridgeport. Both trips were components of her international relations course.

Summer Semester in Washington, D.C.

The Department of Government and Politics is now sponsoring a summer semester in our nation's capital. Students who participate in this select program can earn up to 15 academic credits. The program includes two courses taught by SHU political science faculty, plus 9 credits of internship. Students are housed at the Catholic University of America and placed in a variety of internships which include, among others, congressional staffs, lobbying firms, executive branch agencies, national party committees, and international organizations. Students selected for this program can complete their bachelor's degree in less than four years.

Fourteen students were inducted into the political science honor society on April 27, 2011. Dr. Brian Marks served as this year's keynote speaker. His delivery focused on the constitutionality of the recently enacted national health care law. Dr. Marks is currently an adjunct professor within the Department of Government and Politics. He is also a lawyer and economist.

"Constitution Day" is scheduled for September 14th at 2:00P.M. in the University Commons. This year's distinguished guest speaker will be Ms. Martha Dean, Esq. 'Starting out on right track,' 20-year-old seeks Monroe council seat

MONROE -- A recent college graduate has set his eyes on the Democratic Town Committee nomination for Town Council, while making appearances and speaking out at municipal meetings.

"Everyone should be represented to have a discussion about issues and everything affecting our town," said Nicholas Kapoor, a 20-year-old lifelong Monroe resident.

After graduating from Trumbull's St. Joseph High School in 2008 and spending a few days at Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., Kapoor came back home and quickly enrolled at Sacred Heart University. The math and politics and government double major graduated summa cum laude within three years.

In January, he began interning in the office of state Rep. Christopher Lyddy, D-Newtown, at the state Capitol, where his tasks included responding to constituents, fielding phone calls, tracking legislation and talking to various boards and the first selectman in the representative's Newtown district.

"I can't explain it in words," he said. "I loved it."

The experience motivated Kapoor to get involved in Monroe's government. He attended a Democratic Town Committee meeting and expressed interest in an open town council spot. He's hoping to receive the party's nomination during the July 21 Democratic nominating convention before moving forward with a campaign.

In the meantime, Kapoor has enrolled in a Masters in Business Administration program at Sacred Heart. He is looking for full-time work while securing volunteers and developing a door-knocking route in the event he does become a candidate in the November municipal election.

Monroe First Selectman Steve Vavrek said he is looking forward to having "newer, fresh-minded people" in Monroe.

"He's starting out on the right track," said Vavrek, who has seen him at a couple meetings.

Kapoor said he'd like to see less of a partisan divide in the town, saying that council members and the first selectman are "at-large representatives" with the same constituency.

"I hope we can work together, stop bickering and talk about the issues," he said.

At a June 13 Town Council meeting he spoke out against one council member's motion to delete another member's comments from the previous meeting's minutes.

"I came here to speak about the bickering that was going on in our town," he said in Town Hall. "It has to start here. It has to start somewhere."

If nominated or not, the Sacred Heart Silver Medal of Excellence recipient said he'd like to engage more residents in town issues.

Gary Rose, chairman of the university's Department of

Government and Politics, is Kapoor's former professor, adviser and internship supervisor. Rose described him as analytical and self-motivated with a passion for politics and serving the public good.

"It's wonderful to see a young person entering the arena," Rose said. "I don't doubt for a minute that he has a political future. I think Monroe has a real rising star here."





KELLY LEATHER '11 WINS FULBRIGHT SCHOLARSHIP



Former Student Government President Kelly Leather is Sacred Heart University's first-ever student Fulbright Scholarship winner. She will be spending nine months in Albania beginning in October.

"Now that I'm past graduation, it's finally starting to hit me, and I'm so excited," Leather said recently. "I've never been abroad before, and I'm a little nervous about going for nine months, but I'm also thrilled."

Leather will be continuing the work of Dr. Bob McCloud, whose research on technology in the Albanian public school system was funded by a World Bank grant. He originally visited greater Albania as a two-time Fulbright Scholar in Kosovo.

Upon his return to Sacred Heart, he decided to start a program to encourage students to apply for Fulbright Scholarships. He also worked with the Ministry of Education & Science in Albania to apply for a World Bank Grant that is being used to implement technology in grades K-12 in schools there. "It's a five-year plan, and Kelly will continue that work while she is there," he said.

McCloud could not be happier that Kelly has won the scholarship. "She is the ideal candidate. A Fulbright winner is supposed to be a citizen ambassador, and Kelly will fulfill that role extremely well," he said. "She has all the right skills to be successful. She is the perfect person to pave the way for future winners from Sacred Heart." Leather said she would not be as confident heading into this experience without McCloud's guidance and experience. "He has told me that his experiences as an American in Albania have all been positive. It makes me feel much more comfortable knowing they will be welcoming."

Leather will attend an orientation in Washington, D.C., in July. Once she gets to Albania, she will work for the Ministry of Education & Science with McCloud's colleague, Ardiana Sula, who McCloud describes as "an excellent mentor for Kelly." Among the things she hopes to accomplish include developing English content for the country's national digital library, overseeing an experiment using e-book readers (such as the Kindle or Nook) as textbooks and evaluating the effectiveness of using games to teach math to seventh- and eighth-grade students.

"Dr. McCloud has shared so much with me about his experiences in Albania. I am looking forward to sharing my experiences with him," Leather said. "I'm blessed to have people like him who are just as excited about this opportunity as I am."

Leather, who graduated from Sacred Heart in May with dual majors in Political Science and Religious Studies, expects her experience in Albania to be just the beginning of a lifetime working with children. She credits Sacred Heart and its faculty and staff with preparing her for her year abroad. "It's amazing how you change and grow in college. After four years there, you are so much more willing to take chances and try new things," she said. "I can't speak more highly of Sacred Heart. I wouldn't be where I am without my experiences there. It's so hard to move on, because I love it so much. Everyone there is so supportive of any dream you might have. The professors were always willing to help – whether you were applying for an internship or finishing a paper. It's amazing to have an entire group of people who only want the best for you."

She said she is also grateful for the many opportunities for community service she found at college. "Those experiences opened up new worlds and opportunities to me, and it's something I plan to continue throughout my life.

"I feel very fortunate and blessed. I know this is an amazing opportunity, and I am honored to receive this scholarship," Leather concluded. "I'm excited to see what doors will open for me when I get back, but for now I'm focused on enjoying the experience in Albania, working hard there and making a difference."

The Fulbright Program is the flagship international educational exchange program sponsored by the U.S. government and is designed to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and those of other countries. The Fulbright Program has provided hundreds of thousands of participants — chosen for their academic merit and leadership potential — with the opportunity to study, teach and conduct research, exchange ideas and contribute to finding solutions to shared international concerns. The Program was established in 1946 under legislation introduced by then-Senator J. William Fulbright of Arkansas.

Faculty Scholarship

The Department's four full-time faculty continue to be very active with respect to new course development, student mentoring, and publishing within their respective academic fields. We are exceptionally proud of the political science faculty's sustained commitment to teaching excellence and professional scholarship. A listing of the faculty's activity follows:

Dr. Lesley DeNardis published the following articles during 2010: "Horton's Odyssey: The Politics of School Reform in Connecticut", New England Journal of Political Science, 2010, Volume IV, Number 2, and "From Equity to Adequacy: Evolving Legal Theories in School Finance Litigation: The Case of Connecticut", International Journal of Education, 2010, Vol. 2, No. 1. In addition, her article "Keeping the Lid on Charter Schools: Capping and the Politics of Education Reform in Connecticut" was also accepted for publication in a forthcoming issue of the New England Journal of Political Science. She also presented two scholarly papers at the recent New England Political Science Association Conference in April 2011; "Public Campaign Finance and Electoral Competitiveness in Connecticut's State House Races: The Trial Run of the Citizens Election Program", New England Political Science Association, Annual Conference, April 2011 and "The Politics of Reorganizing Connecticut State Government: Altering Administrative Structures in the Land of Steady Habits", New England Political Science Association Annual Conference, April 2011. In addition to her scholarly activities. she continued to serve as a member of the Board of Education in Hamden and was a candidate for State Representative in the 88th district. Although unsuccessful in her bid, she found the experience to be rewarding and welcomed the opportunity to highlight important issues for the district. In conjunction with her American Education Policy course this spring, she invited Mr. Alex Johnston, Executive Director of ConnCAN (Connecticut Coalition for Achievement Now) to discuss the achievement gap in Connecticut.

Dr. Alka Jauhari Dr. Jauhari published two articles in peer reviewed journals the during 2010-2011 academic year. Her first article "South Sudan: A Fledgling Nation" was published in *The International Journal of Business* and Social Sciences. Her second article "Colonial and Post Colonial Human Rights Violations in Nigeria" was published in The International Journal of Humanities and Social Sciences. Dr. Jauhari also presented a research paper at the African Studies Association Conference in November, 2010. The title of her paper was "New Imperialism in Africa: The Nexus between African State Leadership and the Foreign Imperialists." In addition, she participated in the Presidential Seminar on the Catholic Intellectual Tradition at SHU. The Seminar is conducted by the University's Office of Mission and Catholic Identity. The Seminar emphasizes the importance of the Catholic Intellectual Tradition to the University's mission, faculty's teaching and student development.

Dr. Steve Michels has returned to the University following a sabbatical leave during the spring, 2010 semester. His sabbatical was devoted to work on a book-length manuscript titled *The Case Against Democracy*. Dr. Michels also completed a co-authored manuscript with political science student Seamus McNamee-Perez titled "Hobbes's Progressive Individualism." This work is currently under review for publication in a scholarly journal. Dr. Michels is scheduled to teach a Freshman Seminar in the fall. His new course is titled "Democracy, Technology and Power."

Dr. Gary L. Rose is in the process of completing a book-length manuscript titled Connecticut's Fourth Congressional District: History, Politics and Mavericks. His case study, soon to be published by the SHU Press, examines the changing political and demographic character of Connecticut's fourth congressional district from World War Il to the present. The work also explores the controversial style and contributions of those individuals who have represented the district in Congress. In addition to his normal teaching responsibilities, Dr. Rose is scheduled to offer a Freshman Seminar next spring. His seminar will focus on the 2012 presidential nomination process. He continues to offer political commentary and analyses for local, state and national media.

University Developments
