# ARCHITECT OF A TRADITION

In this the Bicentennial year, you couldn't ask for a more appropriate nickname than "Pioneers." As the nation celebrates its 200th birthday, the Sacred Heart University basketball team enters its Second Decade of intercollegiate cage action.

It all began in 1965 and now, ten years have passed and Sacred Heart has grown by leaps and bounds, primarily because of the hard work of J. Donald Feeley,



the Coach, Athletic Director and "Architect of a Winning Tradition."

The founder of Sacred Heart University athletics, Feeley has made tremendous progress in bringing Pioneer basketball from obscurity to a place of prominence in the College Division ranks.

Even in its formative years Sacred Heart never experienced a losing season. The Feeley record shows ten consecutive winning campaigns, five straight post-season tournament appearances and a cumulative wonlost mark of 177-86.

During many seasons the Pioneers lacked depth, but Feeley's coaching expertise pulled them through. His ability to mold young and inexperienced players into a cohesive unit has been demonstrated the past two seasons.

In 1973-74 he started three freshmen and despite nine one-point outings, Sacred Heart finished with a 13-12 record, before splitting two games in the ECAC tournament at Glassboro, N.J. State College.

Last year with three sophomores and three freshmen dividing most of the playing time, the Pioneers compiled a 20-8 overall record and landed their third NCAA New England Regional tournament berth.

A native of Westfield, N.J., Feeley was named "Coach of the Year" in District I in 1971-72 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. It was the second time in his coaching career he had received such an honor. The other time, 1964-65, was during his final year in the scholastic ranks at Fairfield's Andrew Warde high school, leading them to a 21-2 record and the semi-finals of the state tourney.

After his own outstanding schoolboy career, Feeley played two years at Panzer College before enrolling at the University of Bridgeport where he was a two-year starter and one of the team's leading scorers.

Feeley, the Athletic Director, has been responsible for building the Pioneers' schedule into one of the most formidable in the East.

### JIM KELLY

Jim Kelly begins his second year as assistant varsity coach at Sacred Heart. He will also assist varsity mentor J. Donald Feeley with scouting and recruiting.



A native of Locust Valley, L.I., where he played guard four years in high school, Kelly spent four years as assistant to Stamford, Conn., high school coach Herm Alswanger before taking the SHU post in 1974-75. At Stamford, the Black Knights gained four straight CIAC tourney bids.

Kelly, who teaches physical education at both Hart and Rogers grammar schools in Stamford, graduated from the University of Bridgeport in 1970. He received his Masters at Bridgeport in 1972.

### SHAUN SUPP

Shaun Supp is another second-year man with the Pioneer coaching staff. His chief responsibilities are scouting and recruiting.



Supp spent three years as head coach of Seymour, Conn., high school, piloting the Wildcats to a trio of state tourney appearances. His overall career record was 30-29. Prior to his joining the SHU staff, Seymour All-Stater Joe DePasqua, a 6-7 center and the all-time scoring and rebounding leader at Seymour, announced his intention to attend Sacred Heart.

A resident of Ansonia, Supp teaches math and social studies at Lincoln-Hayes elementary school in Ansonia.

### PETE DIORIO

Pete DiOrio has been at Sacred Heart less than two years, but has played an instrumental role in the athletic department.

A top-notch athletic trainer, DiOrio is the school's head baseball coach and



has done a remarkable job in turning around a program which hasn't had a winning season in seven years.

DiOrio spent eight years at Fairfield, serving as assistant baseball coach and head athletic trainer, before coming to Sacred Heart.

An outstanding scholastic star in both football and baseball at LaSalle Academy in Providence, R.I., DiOrio's experience and knowledge has proven invaluable to the Pioneer athletic program. He also serves as business manager for the school's athletic teams.

### OUTLOOK

"We'll be exciting," said Sacred Heart University basketball coach J. Donald Feeley referring to the prospects for the 1975-76 season.

A veteran cast returns from last year's combine, including the top four scorers. However, two unexpected front court losses have left Feeley in somewhat of a quandry as he prepares his Pioneers for their Dec. 3 opener against Pace.

The high-scoring backcourt combo of juniors Carl Winfree and Tony Trimboli, who averaged 21.4 and 20.2 points respectively last year, give Sacred Heart the most potent backcourt in New England.

Throw in 6-3 forward Hector Olivencia, who averaged 17.4 points, and 6-4 forward Chris Ogiste, an 8.6 scorer as the team's 'sixth' man, and you have an excellent nucleus. Olivencia and Ogiste are sophomores.

While the Pioneers compiled a 20-8 overall record last year, they lacked the bonafide 'big' man they had when 6-9 All-America Ed Czernota patrolled the court (1969-72).

Two-year center Ed Irwin, a 6-6 southpaw, didn't return to school for his junior year, while 6-7 sophomore Joe DePasqua underwent eve surgery in the pre-season and probably will miss the entire season. Irwin averaged just 6.4 points, but he led the team in rebounding, 9.1 per game.

Feeley, beginning his 11th year at the helm, has plenty of contenders for the vacated center position, but they either lack the height or experience. The Pioneers have a player waiting in the wings in 6-foot-9 transfer Andre Means, but he must sit out the 1975-76 season.

Leading candidates for the starting slot are 6-5 junior Julian Tindall, 6-7 sophomore Warren Gary and 6-8 freshman Steve Conte.

Tindall was a starter before missing last season with knee injury. The Jamaica, N.Y. scholastic star averaged 10.7 points as a sophomore in 1973-74 and was the team's second leading rebounder with nine a game.

Garv, a standout at Francis Lewis high, played in 26 games last year, primarily to give Irwin a breather. But the smooth southpaw has shown a marked improvement in pre-season, especially in his offensive game.

Conte, at 220, is a tough man to move under the boards. A defensive specialist at Providence's LaSalle Academy, he also averaged 18 points a game.

Junior center Tom Lynch, a 6-8, 230-pounder from Danbury, Conn., is another pivot prospect. Two other sonhomores, 6-2 Gerry Mikalauskas, who along with Lynch averaged 22.0 for the SHU sub-varsity last year, and 5-7 point guard Joe Jacone are expected to make key contributions to the varsity.

Feelev has another touted newcomer in 6-3 Bob Jenkins, a former Bridgeport Central high school standout. Jenkins was a starter for Housatonic Community College last year, helping the Hawks win the NJCAA Region 21 title and gain a berth in the National tournament at Hutchinson, Kansas.

Despite lacking the bonafide 'big' man, Feeley has enough offensive fire-power, speed and quickness to make it "a very exciting season."

A sixth straight post-season tournament bid would really be "exciting."

### HOLIDAY CLASSIC

The ninth annual Sacred Heart University Holiday Classic has an attractive eight-team field ready to tip-off Jan. 2 with four first round games on tap.

Joining host Sacred Heart, the defending champions, are American International of Springfield, Mass.; Clark University of Worchester, Mass.; Eastern Connecticut State College of Willimantic; University of New Haven; St. Michael's College of Winooski, Vt.; Springfield, Mass., College; and Trenton, N.J., State College.

The tournament was founded and nurtured by J. Donald Feeley. The event, which continues through Jan. 4, is sponsored by the Pioneer Club, the school's booster organization, headed by President Dr. James A. Sheehy. Robert Shea is tourney director for the eighth consecutive year.

A.I.C., New Haven, Springfield and Trenton State are making their first appearance in the Classic, one of the top college-division attractions in the East. St. Michael's captured the Classic crown in 1973, Clark finished fourth in 1971 and Eastern Connecticut fourth in 1968.

Opening round pairings (Jan. 2) match A.I.C. and Eastern Connecticut and St. Michael's and Springfield in the afternoon twin-bill with New Haven and Trenton State and Sacred Heart and Clark vying in the evening doubleheader.

Last year the Pioneers of SHU captured their fourth Classic crown, overcoming a 17-point second half deficit against Bridgeport to register an 85-75 victory. Tony Trimboli scored 28 points to pace the attack.

Quinnipiac garnered consolation laurels, defeating Wilkes, 61-47.

### 1974-75 HIGHLIGHTS

When asked to discribe his pre-season outlook for 1974-75, coach J. Donald Feeley summarized, "the potential is there."

Feeley had three veteran performers, all sophomores, and an outstanding group of freshmen forming the nucleus of the team.

As the season progressed they matured extremely fast. And is there's one thing the Pioneers' fans learned, it was don't leave before that last buzzer sounds. Regardless, how hopeless the situation may appear.

Feeley's youth movement, featuring sophomores 6-2 Carl Winfree and 5-11 Tony Trimboli at guard, 6-6 sophomore Ed Irwin at center, and freshmen forwards in 6-7 Joe DePasqua and 6-3 Hector Olivencia, plus valuable 6-4 frosh swingman Chris Ogiste, dazzled the home town faithful with a typical run-and-gun Pioneer offense.

No less than four times during a successful 20-8 season, which included a fifth straight post-season tournament berth, did the Pioneers battle back from seemingly overwhelming deficits to prevail.

Sacred Heart battled back from late second half deficits of 15, 17, 18 and 19 points to defeat A.I.C., Bridgeport, Stonehill and Merrimack, respectively. They were highlights of a banner campaign.

But the biggest moment occurred the night of Jan. 22, 1975 before an overflow crowd at the SHU gymnasium when nationally sixth-ranked Bentley College brought an unbeaten record into the game.

An effective 2-3 zone defense combined with an uncanny shooting performance sparked the Pioneers to a 47-29 halftime lead over the stunned Falcons.

Bentley staged a determined second half come-back, but fell short as Trimboli canned three foul shots in the final five seconds to secure a 91-88 upset victory, the only regular season defeat for the Falcons. Trimboli and Winfree shared game honors with 28 points.

The Pioneers opened the season with six straight victories, including the championship of the Squires Classic. SHU turned back Marist (85-83) and host 'Kean (89-72) to take the crown with Winfree, the unanimous MVP selection, and Olivencia both all-tourney selections. The streak came to an end as C.W. Post recorded a 79-72 triumph.

A three-game sweep netted the Pioneers the Holiday Classic crown, highlighted by an 85-75 nod over Bridgeport, after SHU trailed 46-29. Trimboli scored 24 of his team-high 28 in the crucial second half and joined Winfree, also the MVP, and Olivencia on the all-tourney team.

Losses to Central Connecticut and Quinnipiac were sandwiched around wins over St. Michael's (98-90) and Stony Brook (94-66) before the upset triumph against Bentley.

Against Merrimack it took two free throws by Trimboli to send the game into overtime before Olivencia's 35-footer settled the issue at 106-104 with three seconds left. With ten minutes left in regulation, SHU trailed, 85-66.

Two outings later, the Pioneers were losing 59-41 to Stonehill before Trimboli and Ogiste sparked a late surge to net a 70-69 victory.

Victories over Marist (96-82), Jersey City (88-85), and Tufts (88-81) went down to the wire before the Pioneers prevailed.

As the Pioneers headed into their third NCAA New England tourney in five years, they knew they couldn't fall behind early against powerful Assumption, Bentley and Hartford and expect to mount another of their 'unbelievable' rallies.

The "Cardiac Kids" tried valiantly to fight back, but were outgunned by Assumption (111-95) and Hartford (102-91).

Appraising the season, Feeley concluded, "the potential was there."

And it's back again this year . . .

### SACRED HEART HONOR ROLL

In its relatively short history, Sacred Heart University basketball players have received numerous post-season awards. The most prestigious were the All-America selections of 6-9 center Ed Czernota and 6-5 forward Ray Vyzas.

Czernota (1969-72) was first team All-America by the National Association of Basketball Coaches, United Press International and Converse and second team Associated Press in 1971-72. He was a two-time ECAC Division II, UPI All-New England, NABC District I and North-East League selection as well as being chosen "Player of the Year" by all those groups in 1971-72. The New Haven Tap-Off Club named Czernota its "Player of the Year" two straight years. He was the first Pioneer drafted by the pros, picked by Buffalo Braves (NBA) on the sixth round and the New York Nets (ABA) on ninth.

Vyzas (1969-73) was first team UPI All-America, while being named on the second team by NABC, AP and Converse. He received first team UPI All-New England, NABC District I and ECAC Division II acclaim his senior year, while garnering the New Haven Tap-Off Club honor as well. Ray performed in the Eastern Basketball Lague last season with the Garden State Colonials.

Sacred Heart career scoring leader Rich Pucciarello was the first Pioneer to gain post-season laurels, being named to the UPI All-New England team in 1969 and 1970. Danny Haines joined Czernota on the ECAC Division II team in 1971. The latest Pioneers to receive acclaim were Tony Trimboli and Carl Winfree, juniors on this year's team. Trimboli was named the ECAC "Rookie of the Year" in Division II during the 1973-74 campaign. Winfree was selected as the Tap-Off Club's "College Division Player of the Year" during 1974-75.

Both Winfree and Trimboli, who have gone over the 1,000-point barrier in two varsity seasons, were second team UPI All-New England picks last year.
