Jennifer Mattei, Associate Professor of Biology, received funding from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to train teachers how to become research assistants (with their students) concerning horseshoe crab ecology in Long Island Sound. In partnership with the Maritime Aquarium, she is running a pilot program this spring with a full program to be run in the spring of 2007.

She received a second grant from the Wildlife Trust involving teacher training and high school students at The Sound School starting this spring. The students will learn how to gather data and study the ecology of the breeding population of horseshoe crabs in New Haven Harbor. This work will include training in the utilization of sonar tags and receiving equipment to track the movement of hsc in the harbor.

Her third grant from the CT state DEP involves horseshoe crab research at Milford Pt. and teaching young students that participate in the CT Audubon Coastal Center late spring and early summer programs. Her undergraduate research assistants help the Audubon naturalist to teach kids how to measure and tag horseshoe crabs and why it is important. She has been running this program for 6 years.

The SoundWaters program, running out of Stamford, CT, will also be running a horseshoe crab ecology program this spring.
