





Sacred Heart University is a community of scholars assembled together in a distinctive setting for a unique purpose. The University, located in Fairfield, Connecticut, was founded in 1963 and has an enrollment of 3800 students.

UNIVERSITY PROFILE

In terms of years, the co-educational University is still young and growing, but it has already made a meaningful and vital contribution to both the academic and cultural needs of Southwestern Connecticut.

In 1973 at the 10th anniversary of its founding, the University was defined as an institution of higher learning, with a margin of difference, serving the community within its region. The University is pledged to the intellectual development of its students with a well-defined liberal arts program.

The University is clearly distinguished by its origins established under Catholic auspices and motivated by the Church's historic commitment to liberal learning. It is committed to spiritual values, community services and a responsible awareness of the principal issues of the contemporary world. The University is further distinguished among Catholic institutions of higher learning in that it is administered and staffed by laymen.

Under the energetic leadership of President Thomas P. Melady, the entire University faculty has made a commitment for the continued pursuit of academic excellence as well as demonstrating their unceasing efforts to keep pace with our constantly changing environment.

The University offers a Bachelor of Science and Bachelor or Arts degree with 52 concentrations. The selection of a specific program is the responsibility of the student in consultation with his academic advisor. There is, however, no compulsion to follow a given program if the student is undecided or views the college experience as an opportunity for exploration of alternate life patterns, modes of thought, and types of commitment.

The people who are the University are committed to the vision of Sacred Heart as a learning center which meets the needs of the whole person. For this reason, the University places special emphasis on a diversified program of activities that reflects the curricular and extracurricular interests of the students.

Outlook For The Lady Pioneers

The Sacred Heart University women's softball program has been a very successful one.

So it's no secret what the 1985 edition of the Lady Pioneers has in mind for the upcoming season.

For the past five seasons, the Lady Pioneers have qualified for post season play and this year's combine would like to keep that string intact.

Sacred Heart competed in the AlAW World Series its initial season back in 1980 and the AlAW East Regionals the ensuing season.

The NCAA started its post season tourney in 1982 and SHU was there again with a third place finish followed by a fourth place finish in 1983 and another third place last season with a record 42 wins against six loses.

Over that five-year span the Lady Pioneers posted a sparkling won-lost record very unlikely to be matched. The Scarlet and White have captured 140 of 152 regular season contests for an unheard of .927 winning percentage and have won 152 of 179 games for an overall mark of .854.

Coach Pete DiOrio is again optimistic that his troops can keep up that rich diamond tradition.

"It's kind of hard to think how a team could be better than last season but I think we have the potential to be just that," noted DiOrio.

But, as always, it won't be easy. An ambitious 53-game schedule that is the most challenging DiOrio has ever put together awaits the Lady Pioneers.

"We've decided to improve our schedule and make it a very demanding one for the girls," continued DiOrio. "We're going to play as many Division I teams as possible and this will hopefully make us a much better team at the end of the season when tournament time rolls around."

The Lady Pioneers will be making another trip to Orlando, Fla. and open a 15-day, 11-game schedule against the University of Detroit March 10 at Varner Stadium.

The northern schedule will be highlighted by appearances in a pair of topnotch invitational tournaments that will both involve all Division I squads with the exception of Sacred Heart. April 5,6 and 7 Sacred Heart travels to University Park, Penn., to participate in the Lady Lions Classic at Penn. State University. A week later the vans head south to Lynchburg, Va., for the Lady Flames Invitational April 12, 13 and 14 at Virginia Commonwealth.

This is in addition to a rugged 14-game slate in the New England Collegiate Conference, the winner of which earns an automatic bid to the NCAA national tourney. The finals are slated for Cal-State at Northridge the middle of May.

The Lady Pioneers have lost only three starters and return 12 lettermen from last year's NCAA Final Four contingent. Tri-captain and All-New England receiver Diane Zalewski (.236) and outfielders Sue Brksa (.280) and Debbie Fisk (.179) have departed, leaving DiOrio with the task of finding a capable backstop and rebuilding his outfield corps.

But DiOrio still has good reason for his optimism. "The players and the talent

are there. We just have to develop it and fit it into the right slots."

First Team Converse All-American pitcher Debbie Tidy and Second Team All-American shortstop Elizabeth Luckie head the list of lettermen. The return of this pair along with the maturation of the other vets, the addition of some talented freshmen and junior transfer Gail Holtznagel (a Second Team All-American

pitcher in 1983) give credence to DiOrio's optimism.

It's claimed that softball is 90 per cent of the game and in this area the Pioneers appear to be on solid ground once more. Tidy, only a sophomore, and junior Nancy Stanton combined to lead the nation in pitching a year ago. The pair sported a stingy 0.21 ERA, allowing just 11 earned runs in 359.2 innings worked. Tidy was simply outstanding as she was second nationally in ERA (0.16), victories (30) and strikeouts (348). Stanton finished eighth in ERA at 0.35 over 101.1 frames.

This dynamic mound duo is now a trio with the presence of Holtznagel, who sat out last season after transferring from Southern Conn. DiOrio now has the luxury of three outstanding pitchers on his staff.

"With the addition of Gail(Holtznagel), we not only have strengthened our pitching but have also added a new dimension in a serious home run threat.

Something that we never really had at Sacred Heart."

Holtznagel is a tremendous power hitter and will bat cleanup behind Luckie and sophomore slugger Tracy Gelsinger giving SHU much more offensive punch in its lineup than a year ago. The Lady Pioneers sported a .247 average at the plate last year, averaging 4.3 runs per outing and DiOrio would like to see both of those stats climb a little.

The infield returns intact with Luckie, one of SHU's best distaff athletes, the foundation at shortstop. Luckie stroked the ball at a .355 clip while Gelsinger, the other half of the Canadian connection, is set at first. Gelsinger turned in an impressive freshman campaign and was the only other SHU player besides Luckie to post a batting average over .300 at .326. Junior Sue Teoli, the pepper pot third sacker who batted .183, and slick fielding sophomore Pam London (.184) can both handle the pressure defensively but will be looked to contribute more with the bats.

Junior Donna Radakovitz (.239) will be switched from left to center and will most likely be flanked by sophomore Kim Schmidt and freshman Kim DeCarlo. Schmidt has the potential to become an excellent all-around performer over the next three seasons while DeCarlo has been impressive in the fall and pre-season workouts and can become one of the few to earn a spot in the starting lineup in her rookie season.

"Defensively, Janine Sesa will have to get the job done behind the plate in making up for the loss of Diane(Zalewski)," noted DiOrio. The junior receiver will be entrusted with the all-important job of handling the talented mound trio after seeing only spot duty the last two seasons. Sesa will be able to concentrate solely on that task as she will be DHed for by Holtznagel.

DiOrio will be able to go to his bench and make some moves if needed with junior Tracey Brown and freshman Maryann Piorek providing depth in the infield and South Africa's Sharon Clarke and junior transfer Ann Farley doing the same in the outfield. Freshman Mary St. Pierre or Schmidt can also be called upon to back up Sesa behind the plate.

Summing up this season's prospectus, coach DiOrio stated, "We're looking forward to what can be a very exciting season for us. We have the nucleus of a very fine team that is a very cohesive unit. It's a very close-knit group and that makes things a lot better and gratifying in the long run."

In just six short seasons Pete DiOrio has built the Sacred Heart University women's softball program into the pride of New England while challenging annually for national honors as well.

Plenty of hours and hard work have been put into the development and enrichment of the program and the results have made it well worth it. DiOrio has directed his Lady Pioneers to five straight post-season appearances while emerging victorious more than 85 per cent of the time (152-26-1).

After competing in the AIAW postseason tourneys during his first two seasons back in 1980 and 1981, DiOrio has guided SHU to three consecutive appearences in the NCAA Final



Four. The 1984 Pioneers won a school record 42 games and finished third in the NCAA's after placing fourth in 1983 and third in the 1982 event when Sacred Heart hosted the NCAA's at Raybestos Memorial Field.

Five All-Americans have played for the Providence, R.I. native who is also responsible for the construction of Pioneer Park, one of the finest softball facilities in the nation where NCAA Regional tournaments have been played the last three years. The addition of lights is planned for the future.

DiOrio is also recognized as one of the country's top softball umpires, having worked in several national tournaments, in addition to the National Sports Festival. Two summers ago, DiOrio had the honor of coaching a select group of New England collegiate all-star players for a series of games with the touring Italian National Softball team. DiOrio's club won all five games played.

An assistant to SHU athletic director Dave Bike, DiOrio joined the school's athletic staff 11 years ago. Prior to then, he received valuable experience as a member of the athletic staffs at Brown and Fairfield universities.

He was an equally successful baseball coach at SHU before starting the softball program. Three straight years (1976-78), DiOrio took Sacred Heart to post-season tournaments, capped by the NCAA Northeast Regional title and a berth in the Division II World Series in Springfield, III., in 1976. That club had a 22-7 record and a No.6 national ranking.

Ed Macciocca — Assistant Coach



Ed Macciocca has been a major factor in the success of the Sacred Heart softball program. and has been associated with the Lady Pioneers right from the start six seasons ago. The Bridgeport, Conn., native has close to 35 years experience as a player and coach, the last 24 in the capacity of sponsor and manager of the Aetna (Conn) Coeds. Very knowledgeable in all aspects of the game, Macciocca has earned national respect for his Coeds, a top-notch women's amateur combine. His teams have won Il Connecticut ASA championships and four New England Regional titles. The Coeds have played in six National Tournaments, the latest this past summer when they won once and lost twice to finish 12th in Tonowanda, N.Y. Their best finish in a national event was in 1977 when they placed sixth. The amiable veteran is always willing to lend a hand when needed for a worthy cause. He was duly awarded the Sacred Heart Outstanding Service Award in 1983 for his contributions to the Sacred Heart community. Ed is the man mainly responsible for keeping Pioneer Park in such fine shape during the season.

Al Yaeger — Assistant Coach



Al Yaeger is entering his fourth season as an assistant coach for the Sacred Heart softball combine. Al's primary responsibility is that of a hitting coach. A native of Stamford who now resides in Seymour, he established himself as one of the finest hitters in the game of softball and made his mark in the National ASA men's fast pitch circles over a 14-year career with the Raybestos and Franklin Cardinals. Yaeger finished his career with a .290 batting average against the toughest pitching in the world. A left-handed hitter, Yaeger was noted for his keen batting eye and was a three-time National ASA All-American. Two years ago he served as a coach for the Cardinals who captured the National championship and earned a berth in the 1984 World Championship as America's representative. An outstanding baseball player in his scholastic days in Stamford, he had a promising pro career cut short by a leg injury.





1984 IN REVIEW

LADY PIONEERS 42-6 AND 3RD IN NCAA FINALS

Freshman pitching sensation Debbie Tidyfrom Vancouver, British Columbia was simply outstanding as she led the Sacred Heart 1984 women's softball team to another very successful 42-6 season that saw the Lady Pioneers finish third in the NCAA Division II Softball championships.

The prognosis for the 1984 softball combine was indeed uncertain after the graduation of All-American pitcher Carol Ball, who had hurled SHU to third and fourth place finishes in the first two NCAA events.

But Tidy proved to be just what coach Pete DiOrio needed as she responded with a 30-4 record and a 0.16 ERA that earned her First Team Converse All-American honors, despite her freshman status. The Canadian flash fanned 348 in 258.1 innings of work, which included 23 shutouts. 11 no-hitters and six perfect games.

SHU returned from a 15-day southern trip to Orlando, Fla., with an 8-2 record and from April 3 until May 12 did not lose a game while rolling up 31 straight victories and improving to 40-3. Sacred Heart hosted Bloomsburg State and Mankato State and won the first round of the NCAA tourney before advancing to the Final Four at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, S.D. The Lady Pioneers opened with a 3-0 win over Akron before losing to eventual champ Cal. State-Northridge 3-0 and Akron 2-1 in 15 innings to finish third for the second time.

Sophomore Nancy Stanton complemented Tidy very nicely on the hill with an 11-2 record of her own with a 0.35 ERA in 101.1 innings. Junior shortstop Elizabeth Luckie backed up that strong mound work with a team-high .355 average at the plate with 60 hits and 24 RBI that gained her Second Team Converse All-American laurels. Freshman Tracy Gelsinger, another Canadian import, was impressive with a .323 average and 21 RBI.

Senior outfielder Sue Brksa batted .298 and led the team in triples with four while Donna Radakovitz (.253) and tri captain Diane Zalewski (.231) made timely contributions with their sticks.

SHU has won 156 and lost only 26 games over a five-year span.
