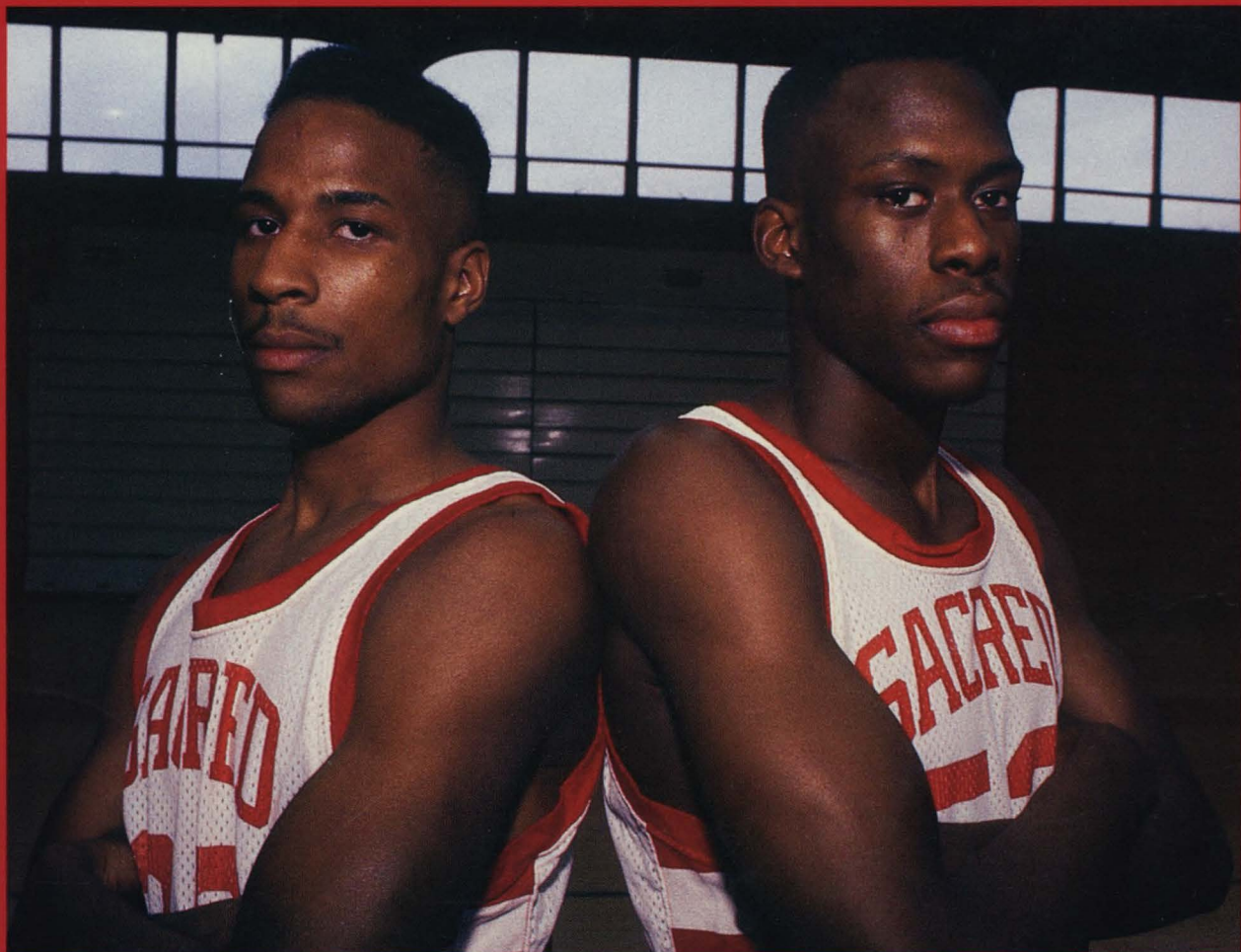

This Is Sacred Heart University

The University: Sacred Heart University is a private, coeducational liberal arts institution founded in 1963 by the Most Rev. Walter W. Curtis, Bishop of the Diocese of Bridgeport. Embodying a new direction within American Catholicism, the University is led and staffed by the laity, independent, and locally oriented.

Location: The University is located in Fairfield, a suburban community of 55,000 in Southwestern Connecticut, approximately 1 1/2 hours northeast of New York City, three hours southwest of Boston and one hour southwest of Hartford. More than half of the picturesque 53-acre campus is bordered by a 36-hole golf course. Nearby are the world headquarters for General Electric, *Golf Digest/Tennis Magazine* and The Discovery Museum.

Enrollment: 3,500 full- and part-time undergraduates and 1,100 graduate students.

Student/Faculty: 14:1. Seventy-three percent of the faculty hold doctorates.

Degrees Conferred: The University offers baccalaureate candidates a choice of 23 majors in the areas of liberal arts, business and professional studies. Candidates seeking an associate degree can choose from among 26 major concentrations. Master degree programs are offered in the fields of business administration (MBA), (MBA/Health Care), religious studies (MARS), teaching (MAT) and nursing (MSN). Professional Certificates (6th year) in Administration and Advanced Teaching are also offered.

Student Activities: Academic clubs, service clubs, student government, newspaper, yearbook, radio station, social clubs, fraternities and sororities are just some of the activities available to students.

Athletics: The University's intercollegiate athletic program now embraces 11 sports, with more on the near horizon. For men: basketball, football (Division III), baseball, soccer, lacrosse and volleyball. For women: basketball, softball, soccer, volleyball and cross country. An extensive intramural program is available for men and women.

Financial Aid: Moderate fees coupled with numerous aid packages make a Sacred Heart University education affordable to virtually everyone. Approximately 92 percent of enrolled students receive financial assistance from federal, state, University and private sources. For information: 1-800-333-8934 or (203) 371-7880.

Accreditation: Accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

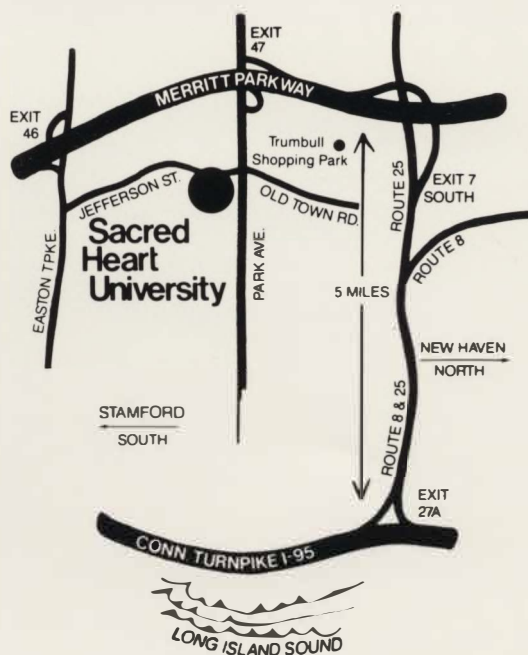
Directions to Campus

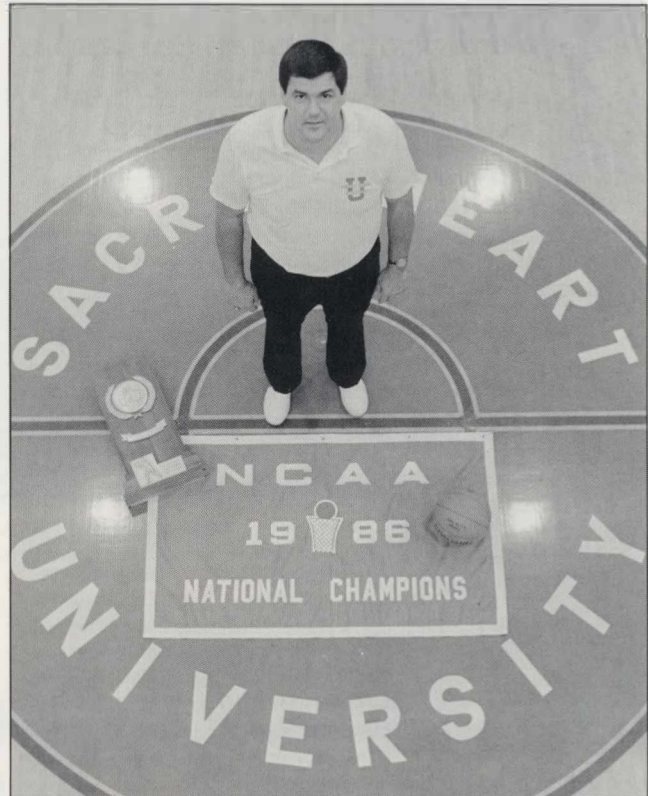
Director of Athletics, Head Coach

Dave Bike seems to win games and friends with equal facility.

Entering his 14th season as Sacred Heart University's Director of Athletics and head coach, Bike's career record is a lustrous 272-127. His winning percentage of .682 is the highest among all active Division II coaches in the region with more than two years of experience. His friendships with fellow coaches, players, alumni, fans and others are too numerous to calculate.

Not only do Bike's SHU teams win games with uncommon frequency, they also win championships. One NCAA Division II national title (1985-86), five New England Regional crowns (the most recent in 1988-89) and four New England Collegiate Conference championships are just some of his many achievements.

Bike's list of coaching accomplishments is extensive. From 1981 to '87, his Pioneers appeared in seven consecutive New England Regional championship games, a remarkable example of consistency at a high level of competition. The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) selected him as National Coach of the Year in 1985-86. He is a three-time (1983, '84, '89) NECC Coach of the Year.

There is no disputing the highlight of his coaching career at Sacred Heart — at least thus far. In March of 1986, his greatest team became the first New England squad to capture the NCAA Division II national title, defeating talented Southeast Missouri, 93-87, in the championship game at the Springfield (Mass.) Civic Center.

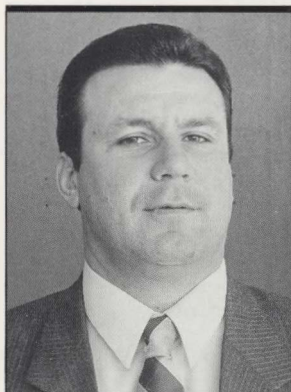
As athletic director, the 44-year-old Bike oversees an expanded department which now embraces 11 varsity sports — six for men, five for women — and an extensive intramural program. Football made its debut at the NCAA Division III level last fall while women's soccer and men's lacrosse are other new offerings. A multi-sport athletic complex and additional varsity sports are on the horizon.

An exceptional athlete, the Bridgeport-born and -reared Bike caught for eight seasons (1965-72) in the Detroit Tigers' farm system, reaching the Triple-A level. He was an All-New England and All-State basketball player at Notre Dame High School and an outstanding baseball player as well.

Bike's ties with Sacred Heart are many. He was a member of the University's third graduating class, receiving a B.A. in mathematics in 1969, and he was an assistant coach to his predecessor, J. Donald Feeley, in the school's first two varsity seasons, 1965-66 and '66-67. He has taught math courses at the University.

Dave resides in Durham with his wife, Judi, and their children, Kelly, 22; Amy, 20; Corey, 17, and Keith, 15.

The Assistant Coaches



BARRY McLEOD

Barry McLeod is widely acclaimed as one of the finest guards developed on Bridgeport's playgrounds. He was an All-Stater at nearby Notre Dame High School (1972), a three-year starter and co-captain (with Robert Parish) at Centenary College, a fifth-round draft choice of

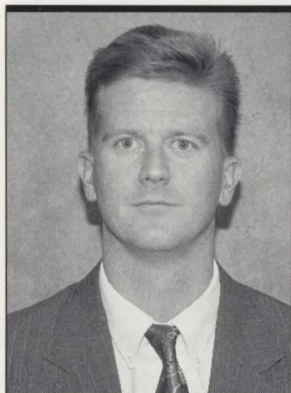
the Chicago Bulls (1976).

Pass behind his back, dribble between his legs, McLeod had all the moves and more. His court exploits were captured by Pat Jordan in his splendid book, *Chase the Game*.

McLeod is beginning his fourth season as an assistant coach with the Pioneers, an invaluable No. 2 man to head coach Dave Bike. He handles many of the scouting and recruiting assignments, and works closely with the players in practice.

Off campus, Barry is a physical education teacher at Blackham Elementary School in Bridgeport. He was the head coach at Housatonic Community College for one season and also served as an assistant there and at Bridgeport Central High School prior to joining the SHU staff.

Always competitive, McLeod played semi-pro basketball with the Panama Inn Volunteers of the New England Basketball Association and softball with Sonny's of Westport, one of the nation's leading slow-pitch teams.



ED SWANSON

Although just 25 years old, Swanson has a knowledge of the game — complemented by a passionate dedication — exceeded by few coaches his senior. This explains why he is beginning his second season as head coach of Sacred Heart University women's team and

third year as an assistant with the men.

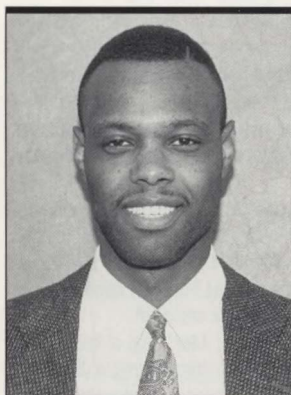
Swanson, who earned a B.S. in business from the University in 1989, began his coaching career as a SHU undergraduate. He served four years as assistant coach and head junior varsity coach at Kolbe Cathedral High School, his al-

ma mater, where he helped develop such stars as Chris Smith of UConn and Milt Pettway, a former Sacred Heart guard and co-captain.

He spends a portion of the summer as an instructor at various basketball camps, notably the Show Me Camp at Sacred Heart and the Eastern Invitational in Trenton, N.J. Ed's coaching skills are also evident with the SHU women's cross county team.

Although standing a shade under 6-2, Swanson was competitive enough as a high school player to challenge some of the state's best, including Harding's 6-7 All-America, Charles Smith, and Bassick's Tyrone Kingwood. He co-captained Kolbe Cathedral as a junior and senior.

Ed is single and resides in Bridgeport.



TONY JUDKINS

One of the University's greatest players—and one of its most popular—returns to campus as an assistant coach this winter.

As a 6-foot-5 forward with strong shooting and rebounding skills, Judkins was a Division II All-America in his final two seasons, earning third-team honors

in 1988 and second-team recognition in 1989. His career total of 2,009 points ranks eighth on Sacred Heart's all-time list; his 909 rebounds are seventh. He shares the Pioneers' single-game record for free throws, sinking 17 against Bridgeport (2/24/87).

Last winter, Tony was selected to Sacred Heart University's Silver Anniversary team.

Beyond his significant individual accomplishments, the Judkins name is synonymous with Sacred Heart's greatest team successes. As a precocious freshman, he was in the starting lineup for the Pioneers' 1985-86 NCAA national championship team. As a senior, he co-captained a Sacred Heart squad which captured the New England Regional and lost to the eventual national champion, North Carolina Central, by a single point in the Elite Eight. Tony's miraculous 25-foot shot at the buzzer upended Bridgeport, 69-67, for the regional title.

Judkins, who was an All-State player at Hartford Public High School, received a B.S. in education in 1989. He is teaching at the Roger Ludlowe Education Center in Fairfield.

A man of immeasurable value in every season, Weild is in his fourth year as director of sports medicine and head trainer for Sacred Heart University's varsity athletic teams.

The 30-year-old native of Londonderry, N.H. is the originator of the Sports Medicine concentration, a program designed to help students qualify for the trainer's certification test. His expanded sports medicine department now encompasses three graduate assistants, Helene Dakin, John Lichosik and Kristen O'Connell.

Weild received a bachelor's degree in physical education/sports medicine from Wright State University in Dayton, OH., and earned an M.A. in teaching from Sacred Heart University this past fall. The Bridgeport resident is a member of the National, Eastern, and Connecticut Athletic Trainers associations.

Mike spent last summer as head trainer with the New Haven Skyhawks of the United States Basketball League.

Questions abound for 1991-92, but potential is evident

There are questions, but the answers are not yet forthcoming.

Does Sacred Heart University have the wherewithal to rebound from the first losing season in its proud basketball history? On the surface, the 1991-92 Pioneers seem to have enough potential to challenge for the New England Collegiate Conference title.

On the other hand, they could finish in the second division, as was the case the past two years.

"A lot depends on **Damon Ferguson** picking up the slack in the middle," says **Dave Bike**, beginning his 14th year as head coach and director of athletics. "We'll also need a strong season from freshman **Johnny Bur-**

kette at point guard. He will make our other players better. Really, it's difficult to say how good we'll be."

The finest all-round player, **Todd Williams** (17.5 ppg, 7.4 rpg, 142 assists), and the leading rebounder, **Rob DuBose** (8.5 rpg, 10.0 ppg) are the principal losses from last season's 12-18 squad (6-8 NECC). The multi-skilled Williams divided the year between his natural forward position and point guard and, on the whole, performed admirably. The 6-8 DuBose was the conference's third leading rebounder. Both will be missed.

Three front-line players return. **Darwin Robinson**, a 6-2 junior with an array of shots, is one of the region's most explosive scorers and perhaps its finest shooting guard. He averaged a team-high 19.2 points in the second semester. **Theo Gadsden**, a 6-4 sophomore with superior spring, is coming off an NECC Rookie-of-the-Year season (13.5 ppg, 6.4 rpg, 43 blocks). Six-five senior **Phil Howard** was inconsistent, but capable of destroying opponents (70 points, 28-37 from the field in a three-game sweep of Bridgeport, New Hampshire College and New Haven in late January). Howard, who has been named captain, averaged 7.6 points — but 10.2 after becoming a starter in January.

All three should benefit from the 5-10 **Burkette**, who was an All-Brooklyn point guard at New Utrecht High School (21.2 ppg, 9 apg). His passing and ball-handling skills are welcome additions.

The 6-7 **Ferguson** (3.2 ppg, 2.5 rpg) is being asked to replace DuBose in the middle. He's strong and assertive. Other front-line help may come from 6-5 freshman **Kapel Pettway**, who was an All-MBIAC center (19.3 ppg, 9 rpg) at Bullard-Havens Tech of Bridgeport. The skills of 6-7 junior forward **Will Burke**, whose 1990-91 season was ruined by injuries, are intriguing.

Four other freshmen may help: 6-4 forward **Brian Johnson** (14 ppg, 8 rpg) from Cardinal Hayes of the Bronx; 6-1 **Adam Brown** (9 ppg, 10 apg) from Xavier of Middletown; 5-8 **Mike Kniec** from Lynn (Mass.) Classical, and 6-0 **Vinny DeCiucis** from Canterbury School of New Milford. Six-five junior **Lionel Coleman** (6.9 ppg), who started the first 11 games last season, is ineligible for the first semester.

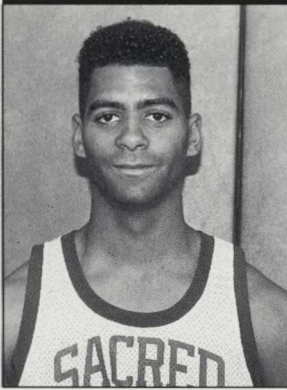

When he's on his game, there are few better outside shooters anywhere. Howard peaked in late January when he led the Pioneers to successive victories over eventual national runnerup Bridgeport, New Hampshire College and New Haven. In that three-game stretch, the player they call "Nice" converted .757 percent (28 of 37) of his field goal attempts and scored 70 points (22, 19, 29). Was 11-for-18 from three-point range. Averaged 10.2 points over the season's final 17 games after earning a starting role at small forward, and 7.6 points overall. As captain and the lone senior on this year's squad, Phil will be looked to for leadership and consistent scoring.

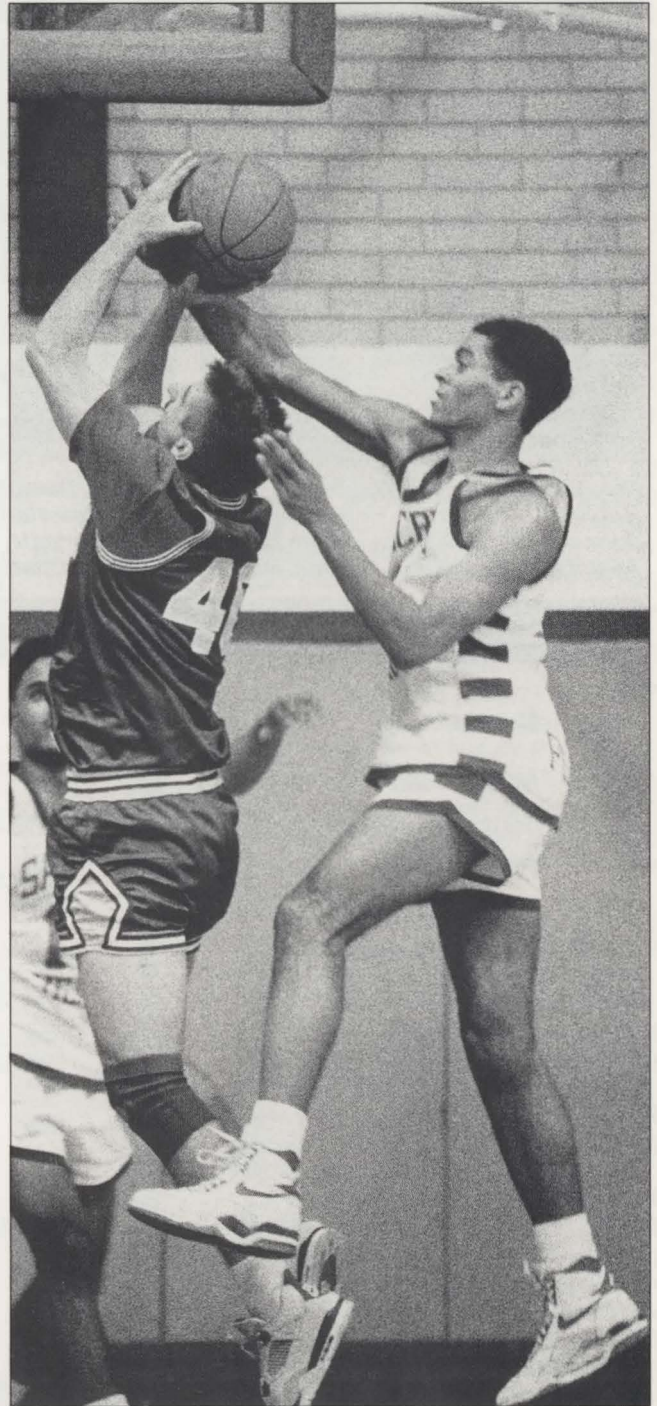
Sacred Heart: As a freshman, Howard contributed several strong performances to the 1988-89 Pioneers' drive to the NCAA New England championship. Scored a combined 12 points against Bentley and Bridgeport in the regional and had five points in the one-point loss to eventual national champion North Carolina Central in the NCAA Elite Eight at Springfield, Mass. Followed up with a solid sophomore season, averaging 5.0 points.

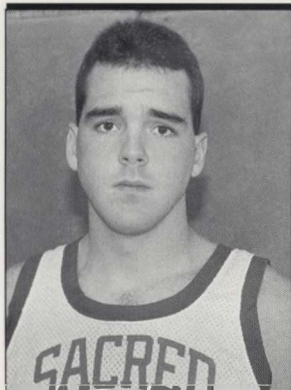

1990-91 Pioneers earned respect in NECC Playoffs

It was inevitable. There had to be a losing season sometime. But even amid the disappointment of Sacred Heart University's first sub-.500 season in men's basketball—a 12-18 season, to be precise—there were opportunities to rejoice.

There was a pair of victories over the University of Bridgeport, which merely advanced to the NCAA Division II national championship game. There was the four-game sweep in late January over Lowell, UB, New Hampshire College and New Haven. There was an impressive one-point, non-conference triumph over Adelphi, decided by Rob DuBose's tip-in with two seconds to play.

And, finally, the 1990-91 Pioneers salvaged a large measure of respect by upsetting Southern Connecticut (87-63) and Bridgeport (85-82) en route to reaching the New England Collegiate Conference Playoffs' title game for the seventh time in the NECC's decade of operation.

"In sports, you often get a chance to redeem yourself, and we made it to the conference finals. That was the high point of our year," summed up Coach Dave Bike. "Unfortunately, we just couldn't take it one more step (in the title game against nationally ranked Franklin Pierce)."

Several factors conspired against last season's Pioneers: The absence of a true point guard, Darrin Robinson's ineligibility for the first semester, a lack of cohesiveness at inopportune times. While the team was capable of defeating most of its talented opponents, it also lost games it could have won.

"It was a disappointing season for Sacred Heart," Bike said. "Unfortunately, there were more negative notes than positive notes. It was discouraging to play so well at times, and then so poorly on other occasions. I'm not convinced that we, as a whole, did our best."

Senior captain Todd Williams (West Haven, CT) concluded his outstanding four-year career in fine fashion, averaging 17.5 points, 7.4 rebounds and 4.7 assists. Consistency personified, the 6-4 swingman achieved double figures in scoring in all but two games. Williams finished with 1,851 points and 801 rebounds—both 10th on Sacred Heart's all-time career list.

Robinson (Bridgeport, CT) was an explosive force in the second semester, averaging a team-leading 19.2 points. The 6-1 guard was instrumental in the upset win over Bridgeport in the conference semifinals, netting 31 points (13-19 FGs including 3-5 in treys).

DuBose (New Haven, CT), the senior center, enjoyed his most productive season, ranking third in NECC rebounding (255, 8.5) and averaging 10 points a game.

Theo Gadsden (New York City) earned NECC Rookie of the Year honors on the strength of 13.5 scoring and 6.4 rebounding. The springy 6-4 first-year man also registered one of the season's most memorable baskets—a layup with two seconds remaining

in overtime which upended New Hampshire College, 91-88.

Phil Howard (Saratoga, CA) started at "small" forward for the season's final 17 games, averaging 10.2 points over that span and 7.6 overall. He erupted for a career-high 29 points against New Haven and had 22 in the road victory over Bridgeport.
