

The University: Sacred Heart University is a private, coeducational liberal arts institution founded in 1963 by the Most Rev. Walter W. Curtis, Bishop of the Diocese of Bridgeport. Embodying a new direction within American Catholicism, the University is independent and led and staffed by the laity.


Location: The University is located in Fairfield, a suburban community of 55,000 in Southwestern Connecticut, approximately 1 1/2 hours northeast of New York City, three hours southwest of Boston and one hour southwest of Hartford. More than half of the picturesque 53-acre campus is bordered by a 36-hole golf course. Nearby are the world headquarters for General Electric, *Golf Digest/Tennis Magazine* and The Discovery Museum.

Enrollment: 1,600 full-time undergraduates, 1,950 parttime undergraduates and 1,525 graduate students.

Conferred: The University offers baccalaureate candidates a choice of 24 maiors in the areas of liberal arts. business and professional studies. Candidates seeking an associate degree can choose from among 26 major concentrations. Master degree programs are offered in the fields



of business administration (MBA), (MBA/Health Care), religious studies (MARS), teaching (MAT) and nursing (MSN). Professional Certificates (6th year) in Administration and Advanced Teaching are also offered.

Student Activities: Academic clubs, service clubs, student government, newspaper, yearbook, radio station, social clubs, fraternities and sororities are just some of the activities available to students.

Athletics: The University's intercollegiate athletic program now embraces 17 sports, with more scheduled to be added in the near future. For men: basketball, football (Division III), baseball, soccer, lacrosse, volleyball, golf, bowling and cross country. For women: basketball, softball, soccer, volleyball, cross country, lacrosse, golf and bowling. An extensive intramural program is available for men and women.



Director of Athletics



Don Cook

One of the Northeast's most widely respected intercollegiate sports administrators, C. Donald Cook, was appointed Sacred Heart University's fourth director of athletics on Aug. 13, 1992.

The 51-year-old Cook's rich ath-

letic background embraces 21 years as an athletic director with Division I institutions—the last six at the University of Hartford and 15 years at Fairfield University. He is a past president of the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), where he oversaw the administrative activities of the 264 member schools and chaired the executive and finance committees.

"The theme of our five-year Strategic Plan is 'Reaching Our Potential,' " said University President Anthony J. Cernera, Ph.D. "Don Cook's exemplary character, his professionalism and vision make him a natural for the position of athletic director. There is no doubt in our minds that Don Cook will be an important guide on our journey toward excellence."

At Sacred Heart University, Cook is directing a burgeoning Division II program which added varsity football (Division III) a year ago and now includes 17 varsity and five sub-varsity sports. More new programs are on the horizon and a \$13 million health/recreation complex is scheduled for completion in September 1995.

"We are fortunate to have in the person of Don Cook, an athletic director with experience and integrity of the highest caliber," said Jim Barquinero, vice president for enrollment planning and academic affairs, who oversees the University's department

of athletics. "Sacred Heart University has achieved dramatic growth in academics, student affairs, athletics and its physical plant during the past few years and now, with Don Cook on board, we have another top-flight professional to assist the University with the challenges inherent within our Strategic Plan."

Energetic, affable and blessed with a sense of humor, Don Cook has racked up an impressive number of administrative tions (1977). In 1984, Cook was inducted into the Fairfield Alumni Association's Athletic Hall of Fame for his accomplishments as an athlete, coach and administrator.

Cook is married to Patty Hemenway, a former actress and singer who played the lead role in "Evita" on Broadway and in the national touring company. As a touch of irony, she is a member of Sacred Heart University's Class of 1972. He is the father of two children, Christopher, 26, and Courtney, 22.

successes. He was instrumental in the development of the physical plants and the growth of the athletic programs at both Hartford and Fairfield, and was a co-founder and the first president of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference.

At Fairfield, the building of the Recreation Complex, the enlargement of Alumni Hall—which resulted in the doubling of the seating capacity—and the renovation of Alumni Field all took place under his aegis. At Hartford, he oversaw the creation of a 4,475-seat Sports Center and helped lead the Hawks to new athletic heights in Division I.

He feels a deep sense of pride in the outstanding graduation rate of Hartford's student-athletes, 94.8 percent. In a recently released report, Hartford ranked 14th among the 300 Division I institutions in this category.

Charles Donald Cook also made his mark as a baseball coach at Fairfield (1966-84), where he transformed a small college program into a New England Division I power. He coached the Stags to four post-season tournaments and developed 15 players who advanced into the professional ranks, including a major league pitcher, Keefe Cato. As

> Hartford's interim coachin 1987, he contributed to the growth of Jeff Bagwell, who was the National League's 1991 Rookie of the Year.

The Brooklyn-born, Mount Vernon, N.Y.raised Cook was an outstanding catcher and authoritative hitter at Fairfield, starring on three Stag teams and serving as co-captain as a senior in 1963. He was the recipient of the senior class athletic award.

He earned three degrees from Fairfield: a B.S. in economics, an M.A. in counseling (1967) and an M.A. in corporate communica-

Dave Bike Head Coach

For the first time during his Sacred Hearttenure, Dave Bike is wearing one hat instead of two.

After 14 years in the dual capacity of athletic director and men's basketball coach, the 45-year-old Bike

now can focus all of his energies on coaching. No longer must his primary concern be the University's burgeoning intercollegiate athletic program, which has grown to 17 varsity sports and will add additional teams in the near future. He relinguished the time-consuming AD role in April.

Few coaches in the nation can equal the Bike record. One NCAA Division II national title (1985-86), five New England regional titles (the most recent in 1988-89) and four New England Collegiate Conference crowns are some of his major achievements. His career record is a lustrous 282-145 (.660), a winning percentage exceeded by few of his peers.

The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) selected him as National Coach of the Year in 1985-86. His coaching brethren named him NECC Coach of the Year on three occasions (1983, '84, '89). In 1990, he was presented the Doggie Julian Award for outstanding service by the New England Basketball Coaches Association.

During the 1980s, Bike's Sacred Heart teams competed in seven straight NCAA regional championship games, a remarkable example of consistency at a high level. They have also reached the NECC championship game seven times, most recently in 1991.

Of course, there is no disputing the highlight of his coaching

career — at least thus far. In March of 1986, his greatest Sacred Heart team became the first New England squad to win the NCAA Division II national title, defeating Southeast Missouri State, 93-87, at the Springfield (Mass.) Civic Center. All-America guard Roger Younger and current assistant coach Tony Judkins were two of the stars.

An exceptional athlete, the Bridgeportborn and -reared Bike caught professionally for eight seasons (1965-72) in the Detroit Tigers' farm system, reaching the Triple-A level. At Notre Dame High School, Dave was an All-New England and all-state basketball player and an outstanding baseball player as well. He played semi-professional basketball with several clubs.


Taking these and other accomplishments into consideration, the Connecticut Sports Writers' Alliance has named David Alan Bike a winner of its prestigious Gold Key Award for 1993.

Bike's ties with Sacred Heart are many. He was a member of the University's third

Ed Swanson Assistant Coach

Although just 26 years old, Ed Swanson has a knowledge of the game exceeded by few coaches his senior. And his passion seems boundless. This is Ed's third year in

the dual capacity of head women's coach and assistant coach with the men's team. He's in his fourth season with the Pioneers' program overall.

Swanson, who earned a B.S. in business from the University in 1989, began his coaching career as a SHU undergraduate. He served four years as assistant coach and head junior varsity coach at Kolbe Cathedral High School, his alma mater, where he helped develop such stars as Chris Smith, late of UConn, and Milt Pettway, a former Sacred Heart guard and cocaptain.

He spends a portion of the summer as an instructor at various basketball camps, notably the Show Me Camp at Sacred Heart and the Eastern Invitational in Trenton, N.J.

Although standing 6-foot-2, Swanson was competitive enough as a high school player to challenge some of the state's best, including Harding's 6-7 All-America, Charles Smith, and Bassick's Tyrone Kingwood. He co-captained Kolbe Cathedral as a junior and senior.

Ed is single and resides in Stratford.



Tony Judkins Assistant Coach

One of the University's greatest players — and most popular — is beginning his second year on the Sacred Heart coaching staff.

Beyond his significant individual accomplishments, the Judkins name is synonymous with many of the Pioneers' foremost team successes. As a precocious freshman, he was in the starting lineup for Sacred Heart's 1985-86 NCAA national championship team. As a senior, he cocaptained a squad that won the regional title and lost to the eventual national champ, North Carolina Central, by a single point in the quarterfinals. Tony's miraculous off-balance 25footer upended Bridgeport, 69-67, in the regional finale. As a 6-foot-5 forward with strong shooting and rebounding skills, Tony was a Division II All-America in his final two seasons, earning third-team honors in 1987-88 and secondteam recognition in 1988-89. His career total of 2,009 points ranks eighth on Sacred Heart's all-time list; his 909 rebounds are seventh. He tied the Pioneers' single-game record for free throws with 17 against Bridgeport (2/24/87).

Judkins' place in Sacred Heart basketball history is assured as a member of the University's Silver Anniversary (1965-90) team.

Tony, who was an All-State player at Hartford Public High School, received a B.S. in education in 1989. He lives in Bridgeport.

A man of immeasurable value in every season, Weild is in his fifth year as director of sports medicine and athletic trainer for Sacred Heart University's varsity athletic teams.

The 31-year-old native of Londonderry, N.H. is the originator of the Sports Medicine concentration, a program designed to help students qualify for the trainer's certification test. His expanded sports medicine department now encompasses five graduate assistant trainers, second-year members Helene Dakin, John Lichosik and Kristen O'Connell and newcomers Joe Galullo and Sue Pastor.

Weild received a bachelor's degree in physical education/ sports medicine from Wright State University in Dayton, Oh., and earned an M.A. in teaching from Sacred Heart University. The Bridgeport resident is a member of the National, Eastern and Connecticut Athletic Trainers associations.

Mike spent the past two summers as head trainer with the New Haven Skyhawks of the United States Basketball League.



The finest Division II backcourt in the East — and perhaps the nation — wears Sacred Heart's scarlet and white. But few teams win championships without some assistance from the frontcourt, and there lies the rub.

The 1991-92 Pioneers skidded to a 10-18 finish, the poorest record in the program's proud history, because the front line provided

virtually little rebounding and scored sporadically.


Even with second-team

All-America guard **Darrin Robinson** (Bridgeport) averaging 30.4 points and freshman **Johnny Burkette** (Brooklyn, NY) leading the New England Collegiate Conference in assists (6.4), Sacred Heart found victories hard to come by, especially in NECC competition (3-11, 7th place tie).


"If we're going to win this year, we must rebound better and play together more as a team," says **Dave Bike**, who enters his 15th season as the Pioneers' head coach with a 282-145 (.660) record. "We must combine our physical talent with more mental toughness to get the job done."

In Robinson, the Pioneers are blessed with a prodigious 6-2 talent who ranked second nationally — among all divisions — with a 30.4-point average a year ago. He soared for a Pioneer-record 55 points against Husson and had four other games over 40. (Note: The Pioneers' record was a competitive 9-7 when Darrin reached the 30-point mark. A late-season ankle injury kept him out of one game). Robinson led the team in most categories including a school-record 72 three-pointers, .801 free throw percentage and 66 steals.

Burkette (6.9 ppg) was a revelation with his 178 assists, and

he provided the season's most dramatic play — the dribblethe-length-of-the-court, buzzer-beating layup which nipped New Haven, 87-85. His cool floor leadership will only get better.

Up front? Well, 6-4 junior **Theodore Gadsden** (New York) turned in some decent numbers (13.4 ppg, team-high 6.5 rpg), but Bike is hoping Gadsden will become more of a consistent offensive force. Six-four soph **Craig Philip** (Bronx, NY), who joined the squad in January and started nine of the final 10 games, gets more rebounds than most players his size: 6.1 rpg in limited playing time. He should help again.

The answer at center may be **Kevin Vulin** (Queens, NY), a 6-8, 235-pound freshman who scored more than 1,000 career points and was an All-Manhattan selection at Xavier High School. Another intriguing frontcourt newcomer is a familiar name: **Jerome Johnson**, the former Connecticut allstater who led Bassick of Bridgeport to a perfect record (23-0) and the Class L state championship three years ago. The 6-4 Johnson, now a sophomore, is a transfer from Maine.

David Charles (Bronx, NY), who was Phllip's high school teammate at All Hallows, is an angular 6-4 freshman who may help.

Three sophomores who were helpful as freshmen, 6-4 **Brian Johnson** (Bronx, NY), 6-1 **Adam Brown** (East Hampton) and 5-9 **Mike Kmiec** (Lynn, MA), are back, as is 6-5 senior **Lionel Coleman** (Glassboro, NJ).

Bike hopes to restore some of the lustre of the 1980s, when the Pioneers won five regional titles, four NECC championships and a national title. If the frontcourt rebounds, better things will happen.

Darrin Robinson20Senior6-21/2180GBridgeport, Conn.

The nation's second-leading scorer in all three divisions, Darrin Robinson reached the heights in his junior season with a 30.4 average. He soared for

a Sacred Heart-record 55 points in a win over Husson (12/6/91) and had four other games above 40, including a remarkable 44-point performance at Bryant (1/5/92) in which he made 19 of 24 field goal attempts. Also glittered with 45 against Bryant (11/23/91), 44 against Teikyo Post (12/7/91) and 41 against LIU-Southampton (12/4/91). Robinson's value to the team was best illustrated by the following: The Pioneers' record was 8-3 when Darrin scored at least 33 points and 9-7 when he had 30 or more. He shattered the school's three-point field goal records with 72 for the season and 144 for his career, and equalled the single-game high twice with six (vs. Husson 12/6/91 and Bridgeport 12/29/91). An ankle injury incurred against Bridgeport on Jan. 29 kept Robinson out of one game and found him limping in two others, but he recovered to lead the team to back-to-back triumphs over New Haven (33 points) and nationally ranked New Hampshire College (32). In Sacred Heart's proud history, only one player ever assembled greater offensive numbers: Ed Czernota, who averaged 32.2 points in his All-America season of 1971-72. Robinson won a myriad of honors himself last year: Second-team All-America, first-team All-ECAC, All-New England and All-NECC, Division II Bulletin Player of the Month for December. He was named ECAC Player of the Week no fewer than three times (Dec. 1-7, Dec. 8-14 and Jan. 5-11) and NECC Player of the Week six times: (Nov. 18-24, Nov. 25-Dec. 1, Dec. 2-8, Dec. 30-Jan. 5, Jan. 6-12, Feb. 17-23).

Opposing coaches raved over Robinson: "He's a Big East player. He is not a Division II guard in terms of talent," said Quinnipiac Coach Bill Mecca. "He's too good; he belongs at a higher level." And St. Anselm's Keith Dickson: "You take Robinson and put him on any team, and they're a legit power." Darrin's off-balance jump shots, three-point missiles and drives to the basket make him difficult to defend. His improved defensive play was reflected by a team-high 66 steals. Primed for another big year.

Sacred Heart: Robinson led the team in scoring in each of his previous years, 19.2 as a sophomore and 22.7 as a freshman when he was voted NECC Rookie of the Year. Sparked the 1990-91 Pioneers to a berth in the conference's post-season title game by scoring 24 and 31 points, respectively, in upset victories over Southern Connecticut and Bridgeport. As a freshman, he reached double figures in all 17 games in which he appeared, with a high of 34 in a win over Adelphi (2/28/90). Now 15th on Pioneers' career list with 1,571 points.

Scholastic: In his senior year at Bridgeport Central, Robinson's 31-point average topped the state. A Class LL All-Stater and USA *Today* honorable mention All-America. Career total of 1,200 points ranks second in Central history. Played for Coach Mark Lauretti.

Robinson, Burkette brightened a dull year

The nation's leading scorer (well, almost) and the New England Collegiate Conference's assists leader wore Sacred Heart University uniforms last season.

Despite their bright individual accomplishments, the 1991-92 Pioneers endured a school-record eight-game losing streak and limped home with a 10-18 record, adding credence to the



belief that basketball is a team game. Their 3-11 mark in conference play was the worst ever. "One or two players aren't going to make a team. You've

got to get strong contributions

from everybody, and we didn't get that very often last year," said Coach **Dave Bike**.

"We lacked cohesion a lot of times, and our rebounding was pretty mediocre until (**Craig**) **Philip** joined the team in January. All in all, it was a season we'd like to forget."

For **Darrin Robinson** (Bridgeport), it was a winter to savor, at least from an individual standpoint. The Pioneers' 6-foot-2 junior guard topped the nation's collegiate scorers — all divisions — for most of the season, ultimately finishing second with a 30.4 average. A sprained ankle, which kept him out of one game and severely hampered his mobility in two others, may have cost him the scoring title.

On the whole, though, Robinson reached new heights in a season in which he earned second-team All-America (National Association of Basketball Coaches) and a host of other honors. Through the team's first 16 games, he averaged 36.5 points, soared for a Sacred Heart-record 55 in a victory over Husson and had four other games above 40. He complemented his prodigious scoring with strong rebounding (6.0) and a teamhigh 66 steals.

How valuable was Robinson? The team was a highly competitive 8-3 when he scored at least 33 points, 9-7 in the 16 games in which he had 30 or more.

Robinson's backcourt teammate, 5-10 freshman **Johnny Burkette** (Brooklyn, NY), glittered as a ball-handler, leading the NECC with 6.4 assists per game. Burkette averaged 6.9 points and, in the process, delivered the season's most memorable play — dribbling the length of the court and depositing the buzzer-beating layup which upended New Haven, 87-85.

Up front, senior captain **Phil Howard** (Saratoga, CA), sophomore **Theo Gadsden** (New York, NY) and freshman **Craig Philip** (Bronx, NY) may have lacked consistency, but each was a major contributor. Howard, the squad's only senior, finished on the upbeat, averaging nearly 16 points over the final 13 games, five times leading the team in scoring. His 11.7 average was third highest.

"Probably our most improved player," Bike said of the former Norwalk High athlete. "The second half of the year, Phil was driving to the basket, faking a little bit and rebounding. He turned it on and finished his last year strong."

Howard's long-range accuracy produced 50 three-point field goals, a figure exceeded only by Robinson's 72 in school history.

Gadsden produced some decent numbers on the heels of his NECC Rookie-of-the-Year season, leading the 1991-92 Pioneers in rebounding (6.5), blocks (40) and field goal per-

centage (.514), and finished second in scoring (13.4). But without a true center to share the rebounding load, his inconsistencies were noticeable.

Philip, a transfer from Worcester Academy, picked up some of the rebounding slack upon joining the squad in January, averaging 6.1 rebounds over the final 14 games (but 7.0 minus a pair of token appearances). The 6-4 power forward averaged 8.1 points.

Three other freshmen, Adam Brown (East Hampton), Brian Johnson (Bronx, NY) and Mike Kmiec (Lynn, MA), also proved their worth. Brown's forte was defense; Johnson provided occasional scoring and rebounding, while Kmiec, who made the squad as a walk-on, contributed some valuable minutes at point guard.

The season's high points? The team's 6-3 record, distinguished by a 97-80 road victory over formidable Stonehill, prior to the Christmas break. And then, in late February, the backto-back victories over New Haven and New Hampshire College, the latter then the nation's eighth-ranked team.

There wasn't much else, except for the NECC Playoff game against conference champion — and national runnerup — Bridgeport. The Pioneers outplayed the Purple Knights on their home court for 39 minutes plus before succumbing, 62-61, on a jump shot by a reserve forward, Keith Hanley, with 10 seconds left.

"We lost eight games in a row and stayed sane by looking toward the post-season," Bike said. "Sometimes teams suffer like that and pack it in for the season. We kept it going and almost pulled one out against Bridgeport."

New England Collegiate Conference

The New England Collegiate Conference is recognized as one of the premier Division II conferences in the nation. Since its formation in 1981, the NECC has produced six national champions.

Sacred Heart University became the first New England team to capture the Division II national basketball championship in 1985-OLLEGIAT

86, and UMass Lowell won the men's title in 1987-88. The University of New Haven was the women's national basketball champion in 1986-87.

In men's soccer, Southern Connecticut State University won national titles in 1987 and 1990 while New Hampshire College earned the national championship in 1989.

NECC teams excel in other sports as well. In a decade of baseball competition, New Haven has advanced to the Division II College World Series seven times, finishing second in 1989. Sacred Heart has made two trips to the College World Series, including this past season, and has competed in three straight NCAA Tournaments.




