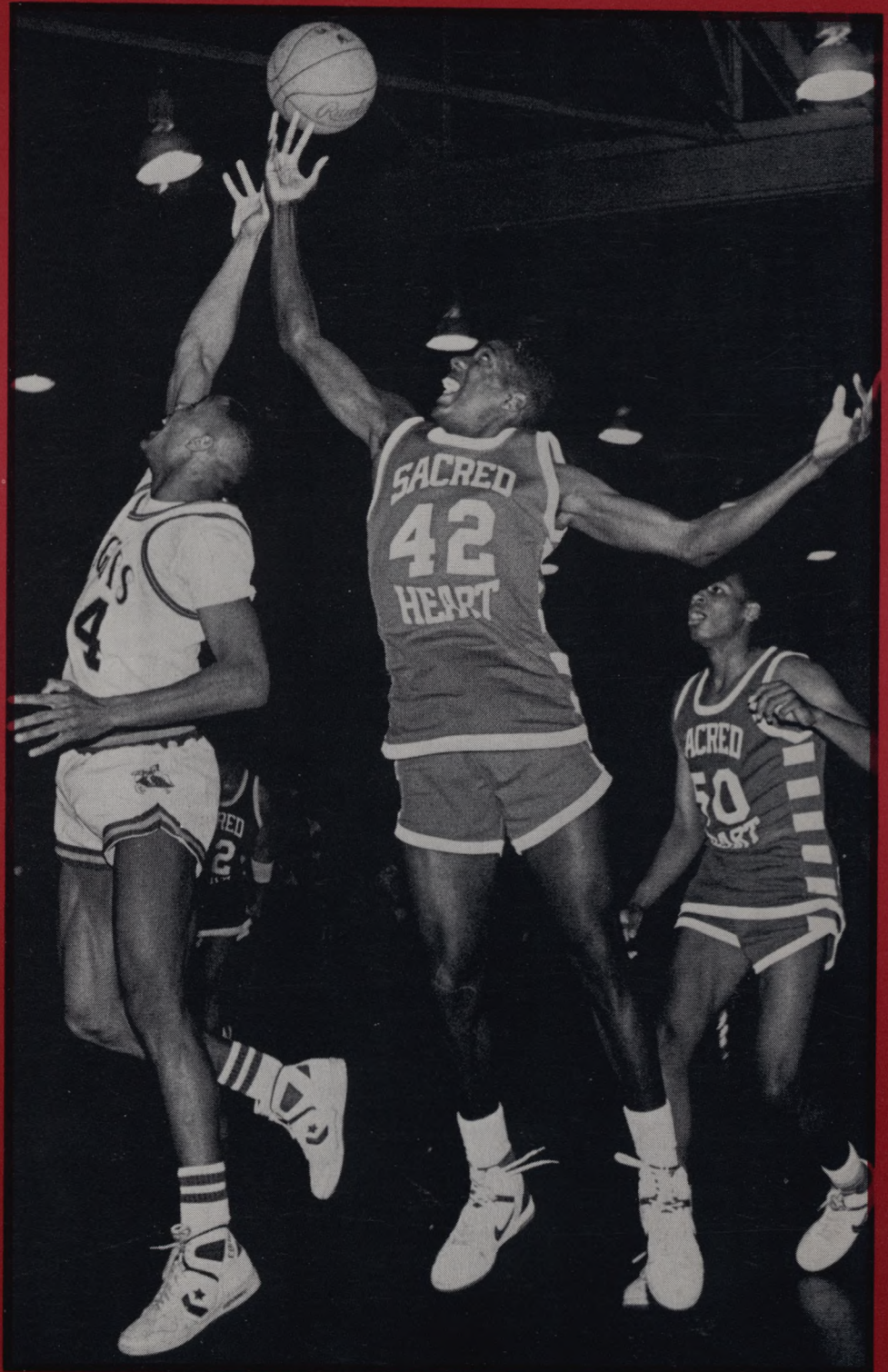

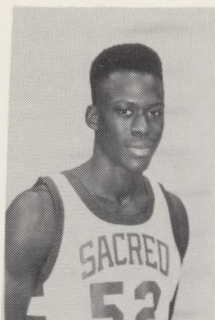

# Silver Anniversary Tarnished; Prospects Brighter for 1990-91

The 25th anniversary year of Sacred Heart University basketball provided four months of excitement and the school's 500th victory. Otherwise, the 1989-90 season was disappointing to most supporters.

Few college teams would quarrel with a winning record, but at Sacred Heart, 15-14 does little to stir the

senses. Indeed, the 14 defeats constituted a school record. Similarly, the 1989-90 Pioneers established a new low with a sixth-place finish (5-9) in the New England Collegiate Conference, setting a record for most defeats in league play.

It didn't have to be. The Pioneers, whose storied tradition embraces one NCAA Division II national title, seven New England Regional championships and four NECC crowns, appeared in seven overtime games -- a regional record. Alas, they dropped four of them, including a 95-87 defeat to eventual NECC champ New Hampshire College in the semifinals of the league playoffs.

"We got what we deserved this year," said head coach Dave Bike. "We probably went as far as we deserved to. I hope that we learn a lesson from it."

The Pioneers enter the University's second quarter century of varsity competition with considerable promise. Based on a strong nucleus of eight returning lettermen -- including four starters -- and four newcomers of note, Bike expects to win far more often than he loses in 1990-91. Perhaps there will even be a return to the 20-victory plateau, which Bike teams scaled in seven of the previous 10 seasons.

Heading the list of returnees are two players with all-star potential: Senior forward Todd Williams (19.4 ppg and 7.4 rpg) and sophomore guard Darrin Robinson (22.7 ppg.).

Despite undergoing arthroscopic surgery in mid-season, Williams put forth a splendid effort, earning first-team NECC and NABC All-District designation, ECAC Second-Team honors and NABC honorable mention All-America. The former West Haven High athlete registered a career-high 40 points (18-25 FGs) in a road victory over Stonehill, and delivered a remarkable 35-point, 18-rebound effort in the overtime win over the College of St. Rose just 10 days after his surgery.

Robinson, a former Bridgeport Central High All-

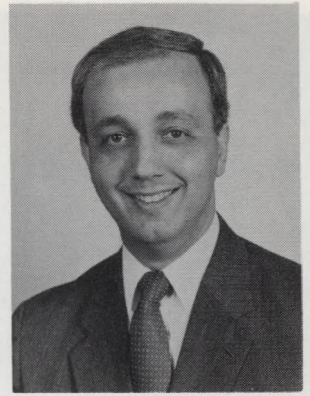
Stater, joined the squad 13 games into the season and turned in a polished performance, edging New Hampshire College's Chris Tate for NECC Rookie of the Year. The 6-1 guard reached double figures in all 17 games in which he appeared capped by 34 points in the regular-season finale, a verdict over Adelphi. He led the team in scoring average and three-point field goal percentage (.478, 33-69). A disappointing note: Robinson is academically ineligible for the first semester.

Bike, who enters his 13th season as a head coach with a 260-109 (.705) won-lost record, anticipates continued improvement from two other returning starters, 6-8 senior Rob DuBose and 5-11 senior point guard Milton Pettway. DuBose, a late bloomer, reached a new peak of excellence as a junior, leading the Pioneers in rebounding on eight occasions while averaging 6.7 per game. He also became more of a factor offensively. Pettway returned from a year of academic probation to contribute 109 assists, 5.5 points and strong floor play.

The other returnees provided some help during the season as well. Senior Kevin Phillips, a transfer from Western Connecticut, deposited 37 points in his first two appearances after becoming eligible in late December and averaged 6.7 points. Junior swingman Phil Howard (5.0 ppg.) continued to connect from long range while both 5-11 Lincoln Boulanger (4.0 ppg. with a peak of 26) and 6-5 Lionel Coleman (3.5 ppg. with a high of 17) offset freshman mistakes with hustle and scrap.

The departure of Sean Williams, a four-year starter and co-captain, causes Bike to grimace, however. The 6-4 swingman completed his stay by averaging 16.5 points and leading the 1989-90 Pioneers in rebounds (9.9) and assists (5.5), a rare double. Williams concluded his SHU career with 1,385 points, 16th on the school's all time list.

On the other hand, the coach is pleased with his recruits, who are talented enough to play important roles this winter. Six-four Theo Gadsden, a youngster with a multitude of skills, was a New York Daily News all-star at Brandeis High School in Manhattan while 6-4 Robert Vaughn (Mount Union, Pa.) is coming off a strong season at St. Thomas More Prep. Size is present, too, in 6-7 Damon Ferguson (Wolcott, Conn.), who polished his game at Maine Central Institute, and 6-7 sophomore Will Burke (Central Valley, N.Y.), the latter a transfer from St. Francis of Pennsylvania. Burke will have three seasons of eligibility.

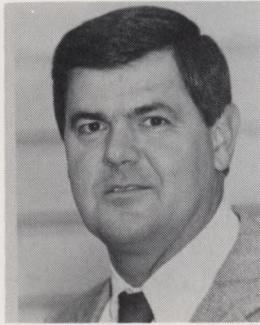

# Dave Bike

## Athletic Director, Head Coach



The most successful college basketball coach in New England is also the nicest.

Dave Bike seems to win games and friends with equal facility. Entering his 13th season as Sacred Heart University's athletic director and head coach, Bike's career record is a lustrous 260-109. His winning percentage of .705 is the highest among all active Division II coaches in the region and is 13th nationally. His friendships with fellow coaches, players, alumni, fans and others are too numerous to calculate.

Not only do Bike's SHU teams win games with uncommon frequency, they also win championships. One NCAA Division II national title (1986), five New England Regional crowns (the most recent in 1989) and four New

England Collegiate Conference championships are just some of his many achievements.

Bike's list of coaching accomplishments is extensive. From 1981 to '87, his Pioneers appeared in seven consecutive New England Regional championship games, a remarkable example of consistency at a high level of competition. The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) selected him as National Coach of the Year in 1985-86. He is a three-time (1983, '84, '89) NECC Coach of the Year.

There is no disputing the highlight of his coaching career at Sacred Heart — at least thus far. In March of 1986, his greatest team became the first New England squad to capture the national NCAA Division II title, defeating talented Southeast Missouri, 93-87, in the championship game at the Springfield (Mass.) Civic Center. This well-balanced Pioneer team was led by All-America guard Roger Younger, Keith Johnson, Kevin Stevens, Travis Smith, Tony Judkins and Joe Jackson. Their record was a remarkable 30-4.

Bike's squads also win in-season tournament championships on a frequent basis, 14 in all over the past dozen seasons. And while team play is stressed, Pioneer players are frequent recipients of individual honors. Five of Bike's proteges have earned All-America designation, and there have been dozens of regional and conference honors.

As athletic director, the 43-year-old Bike oversees an expanded department

which now embraces 11 varsity sports — six for men, five for women — and an extensive intramural program. Varsity football will make its debut on the NCAA Division III level next fall while women's soccer and men's lacrosse are new offerings in this academic year.

An exceptional athlete, the Bridgeport-born and -reared Bike caught for eight seasons (1965-72) in the Detroit Tigers' farm system, reaching the Triple-A level and appearing in spring training games with the parent Tigers. He was an All-New England and All-State basketball player at Notre Dame High School and an outstanding baseball player as well.

Bike's ties with Sacred Heart are many. He was a member of the University's third graduating class, receiving a B.A. in mathematics in 1969, and he was an assistant coach to his predecessor, J. Donald Feeley, in the school's first two varsity seasons, 1965-66 and '66-67. He has also taught math courses at the school.

Prior to returning to his alma mater as coach and athletic director in 1978, Bike spent four years as an assistant basketball coach at Seattle University, serving under his brother-in-law, Billy O'Connor.

Widely respected by his peers, Bike is a member of the NCAA Division II All-America Selection Committee and, until recently, served on the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Executive Committee. This past year, he was presented the Doggie Julian Award for outstanding service by the New England College Basketball Coaches Association.

He resides in Durham with his wife, Judi, and their children, Kelly, 21; Amy, 18; Corey, 16, and Keith, 14.

## Celebrating excellence: 25 years of SHU basketball

Don Feeley, stylish and long-haired, was there. And so were Tony Trimboli, he of the long jump shot, and Joe DePasqua, he of the long frame.

Tony Judkins, the All-America forward with the All-American smile, returned. And so did Joe "Action" Jackson, co-captain of the 1985-86 national championship squad, and Wally Hrabstock, a stocky 5-foot-9 guard who played when few people heard of Sacred Heart University.

In all, 22 former SHU players, ex-coaches Feeley and Ed Hall and current Athletic Director and Coach Dave Bike received thunderous

applause from the near-capacity crowd that gathered in the SHU Box last February 17 to celebrate the 25th anniversary of men's basketball.

Bike presented each man a commemorative money clip in halftime ceremonies at the SHU-New Hampshire College game. Later, Chris Jarvis, president of the Pioneer Club, and Alumni Director Laurie Bellico surprised Bike with a gift - a portable television.

"It was a great night; it was good to be back," said Bill Tierney '67, who was a member of the Pioneers' squads in 1963-64 and 1964-65

when the program held club status.

Tierney's comments were echoed by many of the returnees, who savored the opportunity to greet and chat with former teammates and coaches, some of whom they had not seen in 20 years or more. When Feeley spotted Jake Moore, co-captain of the 1968-69 squad, in the gymnasium lobby, he walked over to embrace his captain.

Many former Pioneers, even those in their late 30's and early 40's, appeared trim and fit; they seemed capable of running a fast break or two. Indeed, several participated in the second annual Oldtimers game against the University of Bridgeport held the following weekend at UB.

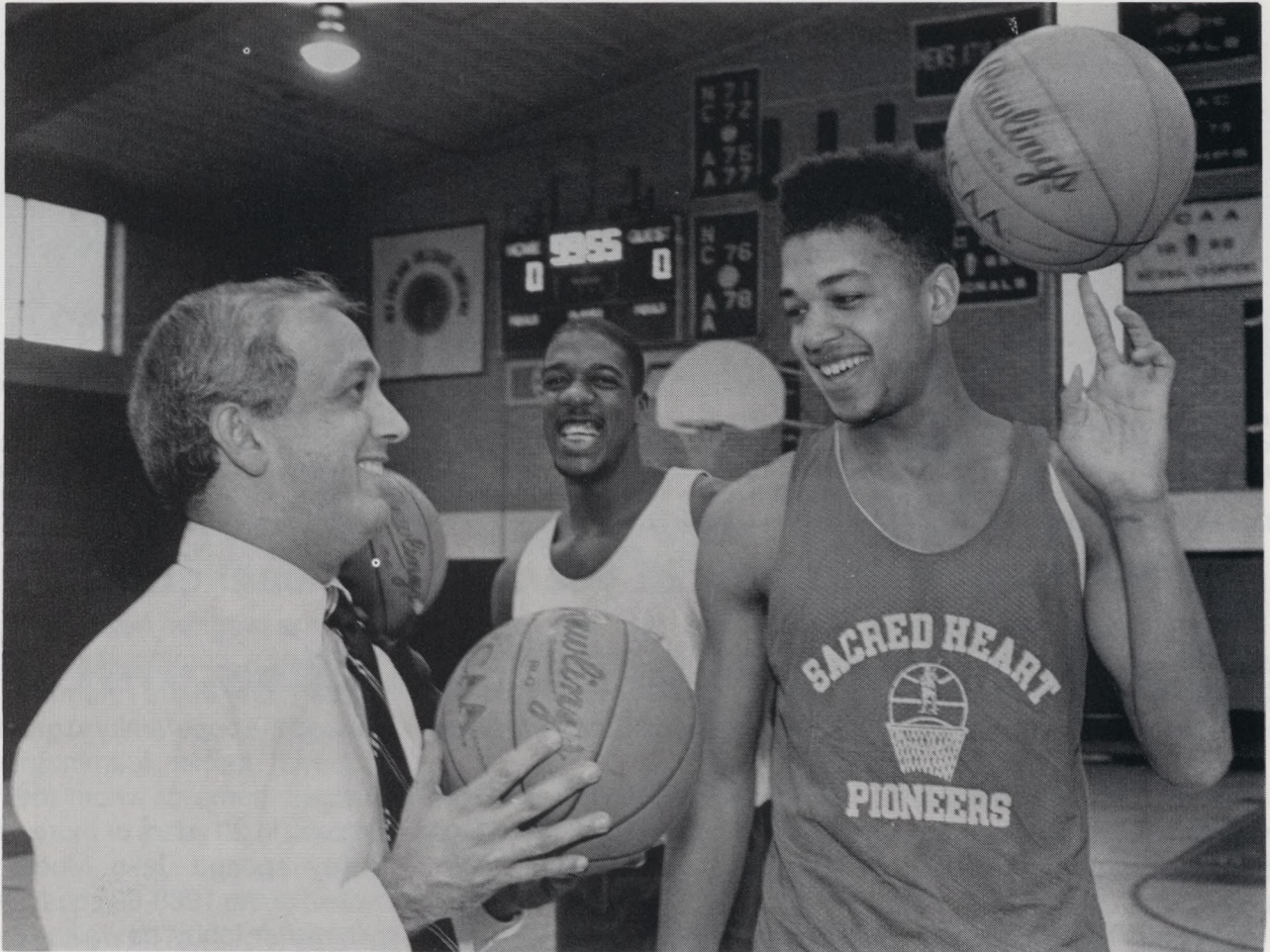
Feeley, who spent much of 1989 as a consultant and coach with Egypt's national team, reflected on his 13 years as SHU's first varsity coach and athletic director. "Not every time in your life do you get to build a program from the beginning," he said. "Sacred Heart was very unique; it was like a whole family working together to make this thing go. All of the different departments - admissions, student services, athletics, the administration - working with a common goal.

"I thought (basketball) helped our academic image. It helped put the University on the map."
