THE FORGOTTEN GENERATION

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PURPOSE & AIMS

- O Systematic oppression has caused many individuals who relocate to the United States to experience financial, emotional, and physical challenges.
- o There is minimal data collection about these barriers affecting the well-being and progress of children from immigrant families.
- o This study examines the acculturation discrepancies endured by first- and second-generation individuals.
 - Aim 1: Identify & examine the discrepancies endured by first- & second-generation.
 - Aim 2: Contribute to a body of knowledge on generational statuses & their influences on parental involvement, academic achievements, & feelings of guilt/shame.

METHODS

- The online questionnaire was targeted towards adults (18+) who's generational status classifies under first- or second-generation, and who've completed most of their academic career within the United States.
- The questionnaire consisted of 12 multiple choice questions that assessed & evaluated both targeted population's insight regarding their experiences with *parental involvement, educational experiences, and feelings of guilt/shame.*
- In addition, the forum was published among several Social Work
 Facebook Groups and utilized the snowball effect in order to obtain a diverse sample size.
- O Data was analyzed utilizing SPSS software database to distinguish statistical findings regarding the topics of study among both sample groups.

LIMITATIONS


- Small Sample SizeLack of published literature.
- Experiences may differ due to ethnic background. These differences are not captured in this study.
- Experiences may also vary due to socioeconomic factors that are not captured in this study.

Parental Involvement:

- o 53.8% of Second-Gen & 46.2% of First-Gen participants disclosed experiencing barriers with maintaining interpersonal relationships, lack of educational assistance, & challenges with their parents getting to know them due to cultural barriers.
- 57% of Second-Gen reported their experiences with lack of parental involvement impacted their educational experiences.
- Future research should implicate methods to assess and examine the possible barriers and impacts experienced between first-& second-gen due to cultural barriers impacting parental involvement.

The Influence on Generational Statues among Experiences with Parental Involvement during

Educational Experiences:

- o 54% of first-gen identified their generational status negatively impacted their educational experiences.
- o 36% of first-gen also disclosed issues with enduring high levels of pressure to succeed.

- o Feelings of shame/guilt due to experiencing social isolation or rejection, leaving family behind, and/or rejection cultural values were prevalent among first-gens.
- O Whereas feelings of shame/guilt arose among second-gens during experiences with racism, discrimination, & oppression.
- Future research should implicate a qualitative study with open-ended questions during inperson interviews to evaluate & distinguish the various experiences causing one to feel shame/guilt for their generational status.
